Audubon in the Classroom

AUDUBON is back in the classroom! This year the Fond du Lac Audubon board decided to start sponsoring *Audubon Adventures* classroom kits. This is something the chapter has done in the past, but had stopped for several years. We are currently sponsoring 15 classrooms in Fond du Lac schools with educational kits. See description below. What is *Audubon Adventures*? *Audubon Adventures* is an environmental education program for children in grades 3 to 5. Developed by professional environmental educators, *Audubon Adventures* presents basic, scientifically accurate facts about birds, wildlife, and their habitats. It comes packaged as a Classroom Kit (serving 32 students) or Individual Kit (serving one student). The program is used by classroom teachers, after-school program coordinators, special education instructors, language arts teachers, and homeschoolers. Since its inception in 1984, over seven million youngsters have participated in the program.

What is the Goal of *Audubon Adventures*?

Audubon envisions a future with a community of enlightened and informed citizens aware of the environmental outcomes of each of their activities. It is a community with the knowledge, skills, and resources to make informed choices between alternative courses of action that result in minimizing the negative effects on our environment.

Audubon Adventures introduces young people, their families, and their teachers to the fundamental principles by which the natural world functions. Our publications for students and teachers give readers compelling examples and activities that show those principles at work.

When we achieve our goals, our readers have the foundation necessary for recognizing our individual and collective responsibility for the health of our environment. And out of that recognition comes understanding that personal actions can have meaningful, positive, and far-reaching effects.

Hike, Snowshoe or Ski While Eagle Viewing

Saturday, February 14, 9:00 am to 2:00 pm. Hike, snowshoe, or ski while eagle viewing at 1000 Island Environmental Center, Kaukauna.

Meet at the UW-FdL campus main entrance parking lot near the picnic shelter to form a car pool at 9:00 am. Dress for the weather and bring a sack lunch, binoculars, and snowshoe or ski equipment if desired. Snowshoes are available for rent at the Center for \$2.50 a pair. Annual Great Backyard Bird Count

The next Great Backyard Bird Count takes place February 13-16, 2009. The National Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology are calling on everyone to "Count for Fun, Count for the Future!" Participants did just that in record numbers for the 2008 count, submitting more than 85,000 checklists and identifying 635 species.

Project FeederWatch Season Begins. The 2008-09 season of Project FeederWatch began Saturday, November 8, although you can sign up at any time. FeederWatchers keep track of their birds during the winter and report their tallies each week.

Watching birds benefits science, but it can also be a healthy part of your routine. Hundreds of studies have verified that time spent watching nature can reduce stress. So why not slow down and watch the birds? Visit the PFW web site to learn more and to sign up: www.feederwatch.org. New participants receive a kit with a handbook, a bird-identification poster, calendar, and instruction booklet. There is a \$15 fee (\$12 for Lab members).

Take the Healthy Yard Pledge! While you're getting ready to feed and count birds this winter, make sure you're maintaining healthy bird habitat in your yard by taking the Audubon Healthy Yard Pledge. The Healthy Yard Pledge is part of the Audubon At Home program which focuses upon managing backyards and other natural areas to help birds and other wildlife. ParkWatch News

ParkWatch of Fond du Lac has received the approval of the UW Agriculture and Recreation Committee for two grants totaling more than \$3,800 to restore shoreline along DeNeveu Creek in Lallier Park and to start the restoration of a Maple-Basswood Woods in a former landfill, now a part of the E. Greenway along the east bank of the East Branch of the Fond du Lac River.

The Lallier Park project is an opportunity to restore natural habitat with native plants and enhance the beauty of Lallier Park. Plantings could include native grasses like little bluestem, prairie dropseed, butterfly weed, wild indigo, purple coneflower, bottle gentian, rough blazingstar, foxglove beardtongue, early goldenrod, spiderwort, culver's root and many more.


