### *Remembering a Lost Bird*

*Wednesday, October 8, 7 pm*

*UW-Fond du Lac, Room UC114 University Center/LGI 114*

In 1914 the last surviving Passenger Pigeon died in a Cincinnati zoo, ending a calamitous half-century in which the pigeon declined from billions to one and then to none as a result of uncontrolled market hunting and the resulting disruption of nesting colonies. In 1871 the largest nesting ever recorded occurred in central Wisconsin. That well-documented colony of many millions of birds covered 850 square miles with nests in almost every tree. On the centennial of this tragedy, Stanley A. Temple, Beers-Bascom Professor Emeritus in Conservation at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, recounts the sobering story of the Passenger Pigeon and what it can tell us about the ongoing extinction crisis and our relationship with other species.

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## AUDUBON FIELD TRIPS

### ***Oakfield Ledge Glacial Habitat Restoration Hike***


**Wednesday, September 10, 5 to 8 pm**

Join Deb Weidert of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for a hike along the Panzer/Steger restoration area located on County Y, south of Oakfield. The Glacial Habitat Restoration Program, operated by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, is designed to restore 10% of landscape back to native habitat within 24 townships located in Winnebago, Fond du Lac, Columbia, and Dodge counties. The program works with cooperative land-owners to manage a patchwork of habitat parcels for sustainable bird and native plant populations. Deb will give us more details about these restoration efforts as she leads us on paths along the top of the Oakfield Ledge. Meet at the southwest corner of the Fleet Farm parking lot to form a carpool. Wear hiking boots and expect some uneven ground and off-trail walking for about one mile. ### ***Whooping Crane Observation & Festival***

**Saturday, September 13, 5:15 am to 3 pm**

Thrill to see sunrise crane training with Operation Migration aircraft at White River Marsh State Wildlife area (weather permitting). Many Audubon members have already enjoyed this experience, so this year's field trip will be on an individual basis. After viewing the early morning crane training, attend the full day Crane Festival in Princeton, featuring a pancake breakfast hosted by the Berlin Rotary Club. Bid on the many items in the fantastic silent auction, visit the conservation booths, and sit in on the speaker sessions throughout the day. Speakers include George Archibald of the International Crane Foundation; Joe Duff of Operation Migration; Pat Fisher, raptor rehabilitator; Beverly Paulin – aerial surveys of wildlife in Wisconsin; and Tom Schultz, former Fond du Lac Audubon member – birding in Costa Rica. Directions to White River Marsh for



the early morning crane training observation: Take Highway 23 west through Princeton to County D (River Road). Turn right on County D and continue to Mile Road on the left. Park along the road and view the cranes. You will see 100 or so *craniacs* waiting for the flight, so join the quiet crowd for an incredible experience when the aircraft and cranes appear. Then, follow the group to the Princeton School for the Festival, 604 Old Green Lake Road, Princeton.

### ***Silver Creek Water Trail***

#### **Green Lake Conservancy Property**

After the mosquitoes have gone and fall color is still with us, explore Silver Creek from Spaulding Landing to Green Lake. The route goes by Sunnyside and Pools Hill Nature Preserves and Sugar Island Wetlands. The Green Lake Conservancy is a community-based land trust that works to preserve, protect, and enhance the aesthetic, ecological and recreational qualities of

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places that make the greater Big Green Lake Watershed special. Learn how biogas potential is evaluated. Hear about the partnership between UW-Oshkosh and Rosendale Dairy to provide renewable energy with an anaerobic digester and visit the UW-Oshkosh food-waste processing digester, the first of its kind in North America.

Many recipes can be found on the internet or even in your own cookbooks. Please bring a label for your entrée, and a list of the ingredients to inform someone with food allergies. Recipe copies are appreciated but optional.

Meet at the Denevue Creek shelter at Lakeside Park (east end of Harbor View Drive) at 5 pm. The meal will take place about 5:15 pm. Please bring your own plate, silverware, small bowl for soups, a cup and beverage (beer and wine allowed), and of course, your food contribution to the potluck.

Following the meal, there will be a short presentation and demonstration on solar ovens.

### ***Community Shopping Night to Benefit Audubon and Just Fare Market***



### ***Help Needed Removing Buckthorn***

We need to adopt wild areas and help remove the invasive plants that threaten the native landscape. Our birds and wildlife are in trouble and loss of habitat is the leading cause. A big problem plant in our area is European buckthorn. They become so dense that nothing can grow beneath, resulting in bare soil and erosion. The habitat that buckthorn offers to birds is of poor quality and nests suffer more predation. The fruit offers little nutrition because of the laxative effect on the birds.

Join our effort to remove buckthorn. By becoming familiar with the plant, you can remove it from your own property. Wear long pants, long sleeved shirt and good work shoes. Bring work gloves.
