Christmas Bird Count

Saturday, December 19, Sunrise (or earlier if you are willing to listen for owls) until Sunset Since the Christmas Bird Count began over a century ago, it has relied on the dedication and commitment of thousands of volunteers in the U.S., Canada, and other countries in the Western Hemisphere.

There is a specific methodology to the CBC, and all participants must make arrangements to participate in advance with the circle compiler within an established circle, but anyone can participate.

The count takes place in an established 15-mile wide diameter circle, and is organized by a count compiler. Volunteers follow specified routes through a designated 15-mile (24-km) diameter circle, counting every bird they see or hear all day.

Landscape Pesticide Registry Signup

If you were not aware of the registry, this is an opportunity for you to be informed when your neighbors have pesticides applied to their property by a professional yard service. Because there can be wind drift, you can keep your windows closed or not hang out laundry during the scheduled time. You will receive a call a day or two before the application, alerting you to the time and types of pesticides that will be used on your neighbors' properties.

Just Fare Market will donate 15% of total sales during those hours to our local Audubon. This is an opportunity for you to find some unique, affordable, and quality holiday gifts or to stock up on some gourmet items for your pantry while supporting Fond du Lac County Audubon.

Fair Trade is a direct and cooperative business approach that supports farmers and craftspeople in developing countries by paying a living wage and providing safe working conditions. One of the main principles of Fair Trade is that environmentally sustainable practices are used in producing products. That's especially important to those of us who are interested in preserving the world's birds and conservation of natural resources. For example, Fair Trade coffee is grown in the shade. According to one study, shaded coffee farms provide habitat for 184 different bird species, whereas only 8 to 12 species were found on the sunny monoculture farms. Help birds by buying shade-grown coffee at Just Fare.

Audubon members who are interested in natural foods will not be disappointed to find colorful heirloom rice varieties grown on ancient terraces in the Philippines on sale at Just Fare Market. Other gourmet items include Divine dark chocolate and quick and easy soup mixes.

Just Fare Market stocks some amazing items made from upcycled materials. There are elegant journals made from elephant dung paper, key chains made from string, table cloths made from recycled saris, and purses made from the pull tops of cans. It's just plain fun to pick up and examine these unique items, and to marvel at the creative people who turned garbage into useful items.

Have a great evening with Audubon members as you browse through fashionable scarves, select an interesting piece of jewelry, or find an unusual gift to fill a stocking. Conservation Lobby Day 2016

Fond du Lac County Audubon is a member of the Wisconsin League of Conservation Voters (WLCV), a coalition of organizations that sponsors an annual lobby day. The purpose of this event is to provide voters with an opportunity to talk directly with their state legislators. Each year, the League sets priorities based on coalition meetings and talking with hundreds of citizens at multiple Conservation Listening Sessions around the state. When selected, these priorities will be posted on the WLCV web site: conservationvoters.org.

Conservation Lobby Day will be held at the Monona Terrace in Madison and is held some time during the winter; the date for the 2016 Lobby Day has not yet been selected. Please watch for the event on Audubon's Facebook or web pages or listen for announcements at winter meetings. Conservationminded citizens need to talk frankly with legislators about the ramifications of budget cuts and bills that threaten the environment. The effectiveness of Conservation Lobby Day grows with each additional citizen lobbyist that attends. You can help make certain that every single legislator talks directly to a conservation-minded constituent on Lobby Day. Participants talk to legislators as a small group, and training is provided during the morning sessions. There is no cost for participating, and lunch is included. You are encouraged to make a donation.

In 2015, we had excellent participation by Fond du Lac County Audubon members. Unfortunately, none were from the city of Fond du Lac; we especially need members from the city of Fond du Lac.

BOOK REVIEW

Rare Encounters with Ordinary Birds by Lyanda Lynn Haupt

Lyanda Haupt, former director and creator of educational programs for the Seattle Audubon Society, "Ts" up to deliver vivid bird memories.

The book is comprised of short chapters with accompanying sketches of her encounters with "ordinary" birds. Some experiences, like her efforts to deter "woodpeckers gone bad," from destroying concerned citizens homes, are humorous.

Other tales, such as her heroism in hand rearing 37 chimney swift chicks, are heartwarming.

Compassion abounds in her writing, especially in the story of the one-eyed Dunlin. Many novel observations, such as the exact length of the winter wren's song, are educational. You will finish the book with a deeper appreciation of what it truly means to be a bird watcher.
